Cancer and the LGBT Community There are approximately 1 million LGBT cancer survivors in the country today. This is based on the common estimate that approximately 4% of the population is gay, lesbian, bisexual and/or transgender and that this population is overrepresented among cancer survivors. Nearly every doctor has LGBT people as patients.

We estimate that there are over 1 million LGBT cancer survivors in the country today. This disproportionate burden of disease is referred to as “health disparities”. Health disparities in the LGBT community are caused by multiple factors.

Cancer Resources for the LGBT Community

According to the National LGBT Cancer Network, LGBT people face a greater chance of being diagnosed with lung, breast, cervical, anal, and liver cancers than non-LGBT people. The increased chance of diagnosis can be attributed to a combination of social/economic factors and to behaviors.

Coping with Cancer as an LGBT Person

In all reported cases of prostate cancer in transgender women, the patients started hormone therapy aged 45 years or older, and one developed metastatic disease 31 years after starting hormone ablation. Metastatic prostate cancer in transsexual diagnosed after three decades of estrogen therapy.

Yet members of the LGBT community face health disparities every day. Studies have found that lesbians and bisexual women have higher rates of breast cancer than heterosexual women. They also get less routine health care than other women, including colorectal, breast, and cervical cancer screening.

Adapting Cancer Care for the LGBT Community While cancer does not know sexual orientation or gender preference, health care providers do, and this can often create barriers for certain patients.

Adapting Cancer Care for the LGBT Community

Until knowledge of HPV transmission, infection, and cancer risk is effectively brought to the LGBT community and until primary care physicians can embrace and provide access to preventative services and procedures, HPV and HPV related cancer will continue to disproportionately affect the LGBT communities.
