Of the 12 archetypes Carl Jung identified, the "wounded healer" is perhaps one of the best known. It is the idea that those who seek to help others are doing so because they are, in turn, helping themselves.

In 1951, Jung first used the term wounded healer. 11 Jung believed that disease of the soul could be the best possible form of training for a healer. In a book published days before his death, 12 Jung wrote that only a wounded physician could heal effectively. In so doing, Jung drew upon the myth of Chiron, making it one of the most fundamental archetypes of human history and modern medicine.

Jung links the archetype of the Wounded Healer back to a Greek myth of antiquity. The myth of Chiron tells the story of how the centaur was wounded by an arrow from Heracles 'bow. Chiron does not die; instead, he suffers excruciating pain for the rest of his life. It was because of his wound that Chiron be-

Carl Jung coined the title "the wounded healer archetype" from the Greek Myth of Chiron. Chiron was a centaur who was wounded by a poison arrow but because he was immortal, he could not die and so spent his days in agony. It was through this agony that he was able to teach others about their own pain.

Connecting with Pain: The Shaman as the Wounded Healer

To quote Kerenyi, a colleague of Jung who elucidated this archetype, the wounded healer refers psychologically to the capacity "to be at home in the darkness of suffering and there to find germs of light and recovery with which, as though by enchantment, to bring forth Asclepius, the sunlike healer." The archetype of the wounded healer reveals to us that it is only by being willing to face, consciously experience and go through our wound do we receive its blessing.

The Wounded Healer — Awaken in the Dream

Wounded Healer An archetypal dynamic that may be constellated in an analytic relationship. This term derives from the legend of Asclepius, a Greek doctor who in recognition of his own wounds established a sanctuary at Epidaurus where others could be healed of their 'wounds'.

The psychologist Carl Jung, when talking about a particular relationship between client and therapist first popularized the phrase 'The Wounded Healer'. He believed that to be 'wounded' in some way could actually be beneficial to the therapeutic relationship. For Jung, 'a good half of every treatment that probes at all deeply consists in the doctor's examining himself... it is his own hurt that gives a measure of his power to heal.
